Disclosure & Apology – often referred to as "Sorry Works!" – is a defined program within a hospital or nursing home that encourages and teaches doctors and nurses how to talk about errors, including offering an apology to a patient/family and pro-actively resolving any claim.

By talking about errors, doctors and nurses have a better chance of learning from mistakes and improving safety.



Unfortunately, for decades, doctors and nurses have been told to be quiet and literally run away from patients and families after potential medical errors. This "deny and defend" strategy was enacted to prevent lawsuits, however, ironically, cover ups enrage many patients and families which increases the likelihood of litigation.
